Ways to vote

The first step is to register to vote



Become a registered voter at
votesPA.com/Register

If you're already registered, make
sure your information is up to date.

Vote by mail with no excuse needed



All registered voters are eligible to
vote by mail. Request your ballot at
votesPA.com/ApplyMailBallot

Vote at the polls on Election Day

May 18 is Election Day

received by your County Board of Elections by
8 p.m.

Voting by mail

All registered voters are eligible to vote by
mail – no excuse needed.

How to vote by mail



1. Request an application for a mail-in ballot by
May 11 at 5 p.m.
2. When your ballot arrives in the mail, mark it
how you want to vote.
3. Put your ballot in the white inner **secrecy**
envelope that says **"Official Election Ballot"**
and seal it. Do not place any mark, text, or
symbol on the inner secrecy envelope.
4. Put the secrecy envelope in the pre-
addressed return envelope and seal it.
5. **Sign** and write **today's date** on the return
envelope in the **Voter's Declaration** section.
If you do not **sign and date** the **Voter's**
Declaration, your ballot will not be counted.
6. Return your voted mail-in ballot.

**Return your ballot early so that it is received by May 18 at
8 p.m.**

Voting by mail

How do I return my ballot?

You have two options:



By Mail

Put your ballot in any U.S. Post Office or official mailbox. It must be received by your County Board of Elections by 8 p.m. on election day (May 18), postmarks do not count.

Or

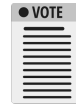


At Designated Locations

Hand-deliver your ballot before 8 p.m. on election day (May 18) to your County Board of Elections or another drop-off location designated by the Board. Check the county website for times and locations.

Voting by mail

What if I lose my mail-in ballot?



You can request a replacement ballot or vote at your polling place on election day using a provisional ballot

How do I track my ballot?

Voting at the polls

Election Day is May 18



Polls are open **7 a.m. - 8 p.m.** Your polling place may have changed. Find yours at votesPA.com/Polls

Surrender Your Ballot



If you are unable to return your voted absentee or mail-in ballot by the deadline, you may only vote a provisional ballot at your polling place on election day, unless you surrender your absentee or mail-in ballot and the return envelope containing the Voter's Declaration to the judge of elections to be voided to vote by regular ballot.

Make a plan to vote



Be prepared for the election

Making a plan is helpful to many people. Make your voting plan here.

How will you vote? [] by mail [] in person

Vote by mail checklist

- [] I applied for my ballot
- [] I received my ballot
- [] I returned my voted ballot

Where will you vote?

Address of your polling place or designated ballot collection site

When will you vote?

Date and time (mid-morning and early afternoon are usually less busy times at polling places)

What else do you need to plan?

Childcare, work, transportation, interpreter (if English is not your first language, you can bring someone to the polls to interpret and translate for you to help you vote)
